Catherine Brölmann holds a degree in Italian literature (MA) and in Law (MA and PhD). She is an associate professor of international law at the University of Amsterdam, and a research fellow at the Amsterdam Center for International Law and at the international research school *Ius Commune*. Her current research interests lie in the area of foundations of international law (rule-making processes; interaction between legal orders, accountability); law of international organization; collective human rights; and international governance of water resources. Catherine is an editor on the board of the journal *International Community Law Review* and a member of the International Law Association's Study Group on Responsibility of International Organisations. She is part of the steering group of the (i.a. government-funded) project of the organization Both Ends, 'The Right to Water at the World Bank'. She has recently been seconded to work for the Dutch Ministry for Foreign Affairs. Catherine has written widely on the law of treaties and international institutions, including a chapter, 'International Organizations and Treaties', in the forthcoming edited collection by J. Klabbers (ed.), *Research Handbook on International Organizations* (Edward Elgar Publishing, 2008).
